




India through the lense \mathscr{OF} STEVE MCCURRY



Steve McCurry has been prominent in the field of contemporary photography for more than fifty years. Originating from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, McCurry pursued cinematography studies at Pennsylvania State University before commencing his career in journalism. Following a couple of years in this field, McCurry undertook his inaugural journey to India, equipped with only basic essentials such as clothing and camera film, to capture the essence of the subcontinent through his lens. After an extended period of exploration across India, McCurry ventured into Pakistan. It was in a modest village where he encountered a cluster of Afghan refugees who facilitated his clandestine entry into their war-torn homeland amidst the turmoil of the Russian invasion that had restricted access to Western journalists. Disguised in traditional attire, sporting a full beard, and exhibiting the effects of enduring harsh weather conditions from his extended stay with the Mujahideen, McCurry surreptitiously traversed the Pakistani border with his film concealed within his clothing. It is evident that McCurry's work transcends mere visual documentation; it is a testament to the profound connections that can be forged through the universal language of photography. His ability to encapsulate the essence of different cultures and evoke empathy in viewers underscores the transformative power of art in fostering mutual understanding and appreciation for the richness of human diversity.

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




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




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




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
